We also overviewed the most productive way to direct parent questions regarding school initiatives (*see attached handout*). Reps were reminded this meeting is for district level concerns; individual student or teacher concerns will not be discussed at these meetings. Specific building level questions should be taken to the school principal – refer to handout for further clarification. This process helps address parental questions and concerns most effectively.

Questions from Representatives

Not really a question, more of a concern. With regards to math, own experience and talking with other parents, lots of kids in the 5th grade bridges program are having problems. Because there are no books, there is very little that parents can do to help support their child. Is it possible for Bridges to provide something for parents to help them support their child or for there to be a presentation on the math program to parents similar to what they are proposing for the Writing Workshop? Since the new math is so different from what we grew up with, there seems to be a need for more parent support.

We would need a little more information on what "having problems" means to best address this question. There are resources on the Math Learning Center's website. Additionally, the district has held parent nights the past couple of years at the elementary schools and is planning a series of curriculum conversations for this year. If a student is having difficulty with the 5th grade program, or any program, it should be discussed with the child's teacher.

Mr. Simeck overviewed the math course sequencing (see attached chart which can



also be found on district website under math http://www.lakeforestschools.org/district-departments/curriculum/lf67-curriculum/index.aspx) and noted that the majority of our students are in the grey band on the chart. The district has built in ladders or supports to help students move levels if appropriate, but the key is ensuring students are placed in the correct courses to support their individual learning.

Can you give us some background on why the change in the elementary writing workshop to the Lucy Calkins? Was our district suffering before? A parent observed that her son 3 years ago was told not to worry about correct spelling that they eventually learn it and just to spell phonetically (1st grade) and then in 2nd grade told don't worry about writing legibly b/c they will type everything soon anyways and now in 4th grade they are writing by hand for an hour??? Are we expecting them to all become authors now?

Workshop is a very well established instructional model that offers students the ownership and choice, mixed with explicit teaching, to teach them as true readers and writers. Lucy Calkins' Units of Study provide very well articulated learning progressions in both writing and reading. Students do write by hand, but are also using chrome books.

Can you give some feedback to parents who see a lot of talk around helping the kids on the bottom 25% and top 25% but not so much is the middle-lower 25%. Their child is capable of so much better performance but doesn't appear to be getting any extra help or attention.

The workshop model differentiates itself. Students are working in their authentic writing, or in authentic texts that are at their levels. A significant amount of professional development time is being devoted to analyzing student work in order to focus on identifying what students need — ALL students. This is a priority for our district and highlighted in our strategic plan.

We heard a lot of talk about the Mindset book last year and through the summer but nothing lately. Was that a flash in the pan or is it being used?



In the majority of the classrooms there is a visual reference to mindset — bulletin boards, quotes hanging, language being used with students and staff. Dr. Dweck addressed our staff at the opening of school and we held a community night at the beginning of this year. It continues to be a focus of our staff and is becoming part of our culture.

The district is planning a series of parent conversations for this school year. Topics could include the curriculum (including writing and math), meeting the needs of all students, innovative learning spaces and how they support learning, etc. The reps were asked for topic ideas as we plan these events.

Culture Fair Grade 5 - Christiana Walsh

Our first 5th grade culture fair was held on Thursday, October 29th and featured Egypt. The kids were treated to a presentation in the morning by 2 actors who included stories of Egyptian gods and goddesses - the Egyptian Cinderella, Osiris and Isis, and a Pharaoh whose children stole from his pyramid - along with music played on ancient Egyptian instruments. In the afternoon, kids visited 5 different stations run by parent volunteers and teachers. These stations included playing an ancient Egyptian game of senet - a cross between trouble and chutes and ladders, playing bingo based on Egyptian facts, making their name in hieroglyphics and then putting them on papyrus, making clay amulets and making "fruity pharaohs" which illustrated the beginning steps of mummification. We had such an outpouring of volunteers for this event that we almost had to turn volunteers away! It is great to



see how committed parents are to their children's school experience. The 5th grade culture fairs are made possible through a grant from the Spirit of 67.
