D67 Liaison Notes November 10, 2016

• What is being done to improve the visibility of the arts in our district? Much of the district focus is on STEM. Other surrounding communities like Winnetka focus on STEAM (A stands for the Arts). By putting so much focus on Science, Math and Technology, many feel we could be doing more for the Arts, which have taken a back seat. Northbrook requires all elementary students to pick an instrument and they are taught to play the instrument through Suzuki. What improvement can be made to the current Arts program to improve it? We are doing our best to build bright, knowledgeable children and the Arts should be a bigger priority. Most of us have to go outside of school for music and arts programs to supplement the school's very basic programming. For a District with our resources and knowledge base of parents, our Arts programming in comparable to an inner city school.

We are a district that has a tradition of supporting the arts -

• At DPM – BOC is embedded in the day – which is quite unusual. Many middle



schools have this experience only offered before or after school.

- Teachers work to integrate with classroom teachers around content that's going in classrooms.
- All students experience Art, Music, Wellness on a weekly basis Grades 1-4 have at least 45 min a week of Art, 60 min of Music and daily Wellness.
- Grades 5-8 (Deer Path) and LFHS have robust music and arts offerings and options for our students.
- Reading seems to be a top priority for the District. How can we improve the spelling program, so it is more in line with the reading goals? How can a child read at their grade level if they can't spell or understanding basic vocabulary words for their grade level. Since the spelling program has changed dramatically two years ago and basically is non existent -- my children have become terrible spellers. It's not just rote memorization being a concern, but actually understanding the context of words and being able to use them in sentences. For example, by third grade my child should know how to spell a word like "homework," which they use frequently. If spelling isn't a priority how can you be assured they can understand the directions for standardized tests too? Spelling needs a closer look, because the current program is failing our students.
- We are working to best embed spelling, vocabulary and grammar into the new curriculum.
- Vocabulary is taught through authentic literature opportunities and through content specific instruction.
- Mr. Simeck referred to research from *Education Week* regarding vocabulary. Language learning at its most effective is active and engaging if you want to foster long-term memory and comprehension.



- Spelling is mostly taught using *Word Their Way* assessments are done three times a year to show growth across different spelling stages. Teachers assess students in various on-going ways, which may look like a spelling test, or through their reading and writing. Additionally, word lists of high frequency words were developed last year and are being utilized K-4.
- 2B) Why are vocabulary and spelling not a priority? You are wanting kids to love reading, however to do this they need to know vocabulary words!! There has been a slope in these areas for the last two years. We do have these concepts as a priority – the methods of teaching these concepts have evolved and improved over the years. 2C) Why are we taking away some of the basics like handwriting, spelling, vocabulary? I want a good answer on how taking this away is actually going to benefit my children. It's been two years and I can't see the benefits!! I'm very frustrated by this as a parent, and educator.

- Handwriting is taught explicitly at the beginning of Kindergarten using *Handwriting Without Tears.*
- Teachers continue to work as needed on this through the other grade levels.
 3) Is there a good reason why teachers can't do math minute facts? These can only help our children in multiple ways.
- Much research shows that math fact tests cause more harm than good. There is a great deal of anxiety associated with math fact tests, which we try to avoid.
- Additionally, our math fact fluency is not just focused on memorization but on fluency through efficiency, accuracy & flexibility. 4) Why are book reports not being done? This is going to hurt our kids if they do not know



how to do these.

- Through our new curriculum the focus is on the work of being a reader and writer and doing tasks that match that focus.
- Often when students complete a task like a book report it is purely to do that "task" – but not about the learning of how be a more expert reader of text. 5) I would like to see a survey to parents on several things: a teacher evaluation at mid and end of year. A survey to see how parents feel about our curriculum and lack of certain things. We will be conducting a Culture and Climate Survey with all parents this

spring. We encourage all to participate. If a parent has individual, specific feedback about a teacher or program they should talk to their building principal.

1) Can you speak to the new HS how is it working for students, teachers & parents?

Feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. We recently held two parent feedback sessions and have met with staff and students. The later start times, availability of course selection options, resources and support, and the new food service have all been noted as positive changes. We will continue to monitor and make adjustments, as this is the first year of a significant change. Mr. Simeck reviewed the daily schedule with the group.

2)There were some Patch articles regarding the collapse of the North Chicago School District. If that were to happen how would it impact our district?

Last spring, the reorganization of North Chicago's Charter School system and the restructuring of the district's funding helped to stabilize North Chicago public schools. State funding and state legislation continue to play a significant role in this and other school districts' financial well- being. We will continue to monitor changes to the state budget, funding formula and its impact on school



districts throughout Illinois.
