President - Call to Order

Guest Speaker - Barry Rodgers, LFHS Principal

- Mr. Rodgers welcomed the group to the Innovation Incubator, a new classroom in LFHS that boasts state of the art technology. The space used to be institutional-looking and housed the math resource center, which has now been moved.
- The high school offers a new entrepreneur business class that takes place in the Innovation Incubator. It is an inquiry-based class and uses a college-level business model curriculum. Community mentors are brought in to coach student groups. The winner receives \$10k to fund their business idea. Other classes can use the Innovation Incubator space too.
- Leading Edge Learning is preparing LFHS students for their futures. The 2014 freshman class piloted a one-to-one device program each student received a Yoga Chromebook. There is a "Yoga Studio" and a "Chrome Depot" for Chromebook questions and repairs. Next year, all LFHS students will have a Chromebook.
- The real goal is to help our students develop the skills they need to be successful, not to develop students for industry-specific jobs.
- Another important initiative is making sure that all LFHS students are successful. The administration, including Mr. Simeck, Ms. Wilcox, and Ms. Fagel, has talked with veteran LFHS teachers and determined areas of



potential growth. We found that there was a whole group of kids that could have been doing better. 53% of kids weren't taking any AP course and our peer schools had 70% of kids taking them. 99% of our students go to university, but only 47% had taken an AP course. We asked ourselves if there were arbitrary obstacles preventing students from taking these courses.

- Mr. Rodgers introduced Jim Sullivan, Assistant Principal and Science Dept Chair, to discuss findings:
 - O Mr. Sullivan said they found that there were barriers to AP courses for some students, based on past performance. This is like saying to a kid "that's all you can do." We've removed barriers and added support systems for students, including training 100 students to be peer tutors. The support systems mean that kids don't have to choose to drop to an easier level when they start to do poorly. This year we've had a 32% increase in AP class enrollment and fewer drops than ever.
- Mr. Rodgers indicated that they also found gaps in the math curriculum, so they are redesigning it and creating summer "ladders" for students. Before, a student would sometimes find themselves choosing between a class that was too challenging (where they might know 90% of what they need to succeed) and a class that was too easy. Now, that student will have a "ladder" that will help him or her gain that 10% knowledge so they can succeed in the higher level math course.
- It's important for kids to have a great high school experience. Students are encouraged to get involved and there are some exciting new opportunities offered, including a robotics team, fishing team, guitar making class, and AP public policy and environmental study. LFHS Theater, Model UN, and athletics are other ways students can get involved. There are 60 clubs that students can join, so there is something for everyone. An area in the basement is being converted into a robotics space.

Question and Answer Session:

Q - *When is Pitch Night?*

A - One the evening of May 28, the final 5 groups in the entrepreneur class will give their pitches. Anyone may come.

Q - What's going on with the LFHS Math program?



A - LFHS hired Joe Obrycki, the LFHS Math Instructional Director, and he discovered problems in 6,7,8 grade transitions. Joe has helped develop a new curriculum. All parents are invited to a meeting on May 27 at 7pm.

- Q At what point in the DPM progression does a student choose a math track?
- A Teachers will help determine, but "ladders" will also be available.
- Q What's happening with the block schedule? Will it be revisited?

A - There is a lot of value in moving to this type of schedule. The District leadership team, BOE and parents were ready. But we were out of a contract cycle, so it didn't go anywhere with the collective bargaining group. Contract renewal is coming up and we are hoping for a new schedule to part of that agreement. Schools we would like to emulate use a block schedule. It's less about academic achievement and more about opportunity.

A (Jim Sullivan) - We began a relationship with Northwestern a few weeks ago. We are testing out some curriculum. It's the beginning of good relationship.

Administrator Reports

Tom Cardamone, Principal 5/6 and Michael Kroll, Assistant Principal 5/6

- PARCC testing for 5th and 6th will be the week of 5/11. This round of tests is supposed to be easiest type of test less open response and more multiple choice.
- Incoming 5th graders (current 4th graders) are beginning their orientation. They will be at DPM today to see a performance of the DPM spring musical. "Buddy Day" will be on May 5th - this is when each 4th grade classroom is paired with a 5th grade classroom and is part of the incoming 5th grade orientation.
- There is a 5th grade Culture Fair this Thursday.
- Parents of incoming 4th graders are invited to an orientation with DPM admin/faculty on May 4. The APT is hosting "Jump Start into 5th Grade" on May 12th and Mr. Cardamone and Mr. Kroll will attend.
- The Growth and Development unit for current 6th graders is coming up at the beginning of May. Parents will receive information about this unit.
- NWEA testing is taking place now. Now that students can take the test on their Chromebooks instead of going to a separate testing area, there is less



disruption in their day.

Renee DeVore, Principal 7/8 and Paul Suminski, Assistant Principal 7/8

• Joe Obrycki is the LFHS Math Instructional Director and he has been working on streamlining the math curriculum, paying special attention to gaps and problems that have been noted in the freshman transition. In particular, it seemed that students were often faced with choosing a course that was either too challenging or too easy for them. There will be shifts in the math curriculum in middle school and high school. There will be "ladders" so that students can make an easier transition from one "track" to another. High school AP courses will be open to more students. However, just because the doors are open doesn't mean we are shoving kids through. DPM has been working closely with Mr. Obrycki, providing him with data needed to analyze the math needs of students.

Question/Answer Session during the meeting:

Q - Will there be summer laddering for middle school students too?

A - We are trying to figure it out. We would like to do it for middle school students soon.

Q - So will there be laddering for student moving from 7th to 8th?

A - It's more of a realignment of the courses for the current 7th grade. There may be more laddering for students moving from 6th to 7th.

Q - So the current 7th grade won't see the benefits of these changes to the math curriculum?

A - Yes they will. Realignment means that if the student has the math knowledge, then he or she can enter a class no matter the "track" they may have been on before.

Q - Are the levels (core, explore, quest) going away?

A - Not really, but we are going to call math courses by their name and not just a level (e.g. Algebra).

Q - For math students in a flipped classroom, how will you transition them from 8th to 9th grade?

A - Good question. We are not sure of the specifics, but Joe (Obrycki) is progressive and there are some flipped classrooms in LFHS.

Q - I'm concerned about "laddering" happening in the summer because kids' camp schedules and family time may prevent them from taking a class. It's important for



kids to have summer "relax" and "family" time.

A - We don't know exactly what ideas the committee is going to come up with, but we know that they will create opportunities for kids to move up.

Q - Will there still be a focus on NWEA scores? It seems like that has precluded some kids from shifting "tracks."

A - We are using a variety of data points to determine the appropriate math course for students and this includes the NWEA. The matrix that D67 has used in the past will be adjusted, but NWEA scores will still be used. It doesn't seem like there has been a closed door policy because not only NWEA is looked at. Additional testing and data points come into play for an informed decision. For younger student, their CogAt scores and classroom performance are important considerations.

- On 4/27 at 7pm there will be a meeting to discuss changes to the math curriculum.
- On 4/29 there will be an orientation with Renee and Paul for incoming 7th graders.
- On 5/5 at 9:30am and 6:30pm there will be a parent orientation with Renee and Paul for parents of incoming 7th graders.
- On 5/12 the 8th grade will take its class photo.
- We have been having "Behavioral Expectations" talks with 7th and 8th grade students. The message is for students to end their year on a positive note. There are privileges/activities coming up we don't want to take these away, but we will if behavioral expectations are not met.
- We have been working on the new DPM master schedule. We've decided to keep the 4 person team structure. There will be more changes for current 7th graders than any other grade level. We will bring 2 teachers on to the Maroon 7 team and some students will be moved from Blue and Gold to Maroon, although there may be some cross-teaming for math.

Q - Will you take into account parent/student preferences (e.g. if they don't like current team or teacher)?

A - We tried getting feedback before, but it was almost harder to explain decisions. Renee and I are starting to discuss this, but nothing has been decided yet. We don't want to open the door and then not offer it.

Q - Will BOC impact where they end up?

A - No because those classes are during non-core time. Double BOC students can retain



those classes.

Q - When will you let parents and students know about these changes?

A - We are solidifying teaming this week and then we can start looking at where students will be moved. Ideally, parents and students will know before summer break. Q - What are the options for math for incoming 8th? Is the high school course still an option?

A - Yes it will still be an option to take the high school course. We are also looking at the Quest class that stays back and where those students will end up freshman year. The Math department is ironing this out.

- Montgomery and Weber will join the 7th/8th side next year.
- The day of the Graduation Dance (a Friday) is a full mandatory day for student attendance. Please schedule hair/nail appointments accordingly. There is a mandatory practice on Graduation day, but it is only a half day. At 4:30pm, student will come back to West Campus for graduation. Girls wear pastels, boys wear tie and blazer, no tennis shoes.
- There are no tickets for graduation doors open at 4pm and the ceremony is at 5pm. Seating is first come, first served.
- PARCC testing the week of 5/4 for 7th and 8th. Shorter testing periods and more multiple choice morning testing and regular shortened periods in afternoon. There will be 4 days of testing for grades 6-8 and 3 days of testing for grade 5.

Q - *C2015* has something scheduled for 8th graders during the week of PARCC. Will students be available to do this during homeroom? *A* - No. Eliminated HR for that week.

- *Q* Will there be an 8th grade Field trip?
- A Friday May 8, we think
- Q We really do need more cultural experiences for grades 7 and 8.

A - We do want meaningful experiences for our students. We are looking at more choice based trips. For example, the 5th graders were given the option of going to the Field Museum OR the Science and Industry Museum for a field trip.

Compensation Committee did not meet.

Education Committee did not meet.

Policy Compensation Committee did not meet.

Finance Committee, Rick Schuler:

The Board approved two student fee increases for 2015-16. Student lunches will be increased by 5% to cover inflationary expenses. Bus enrollment late fees will be increased from \$25 to \$50. It is critical for the bus company to receive information in a timely manner so by raising the late fee to \$50, the Board hopes to encourage more users to submit on time.

The 5-year capital project budget was updated to include all life safety requirements as well as to catch up on maintenance at all buildings.

The Citadel Theater currently rents space from the District. It requested a slight rent reduction, which was approved. This is still a profit for the District even with the reduction.

There is no change to the 20-year end projection budget.

Executive Director of Growth and Talent Development, Lori Wilcox:

There will be a reduction of force for the 2015-16 school year due to enrollment.



This includes one Art position, one Music position, and four World Language positions. While it is a slight reduction in staff, there will be no change in the offerings for Art and Music. The World Language offerings have been modified – please see link above for more information.
